To begin, they'll employ engaging strategies to capture the reader's attention. Then, they'll clearly state their opinion on the topic at hand, expressing it with confidence and conviction. Using a metaphor will add depth and creativity to their argument. As they present their reasons, they'll use transition words like "first," "next," and "finally" to guide the reader through their argument seamlessly. Finally, they'll wrap up their opinion piece with a restatement of their opinion that reinforces their main point. Through this process, your child will not only develop their writing skills but also learn the power of persuasion and self-expression.

Ideas for Home Support

As your child practices writing an opinion paper at school you might consider practicing at home with the following ideas:

- Have your child conduct opinion polls among family members or friends on various topics. They can ask questions like "Which is better: dogs or cats?" or "Should students have homework on weekends?"
- Host a family debate night where everyone gets to share their opinions on different topics. Encourage your child to present their opinion and provide reasons to support it.
- Invite your child to write opinion editorials on topics they feel strongly about. They can choose to write about issues related to their school, community, or personal interests.
- Play Fact or Opinion with your child. Tell your child to decide if you are telling them a fact or opinion. Say things like, "Trees need air to grow. Fact or opinion?" or "Everyone needs trees in their yard. Fact or Opinion?"
