

Six Traits of Writing

Dear Parents,

I am thrilled to have the opportunity to explore the joy of writing with your child. During this year's writing instruction, students will have many opportunities to share stories and ideas. As a class, we will spend thirty to forty minutes each day in a variety of writing activities.

During our first writing unit, the class will be introduced to the Six Traits of Writing. The traits are the qualities that are present in good writing. They consist of **Idea**, **Organization**, **Voice**, **Word Choice**, **Sentence Fluency**, **Conventions**, and the element of **Presentation**, where the students learn that writing neatly leaves an impression on the reader. In this unit, your child will participate in activities associated with each trait, preparing them to apply these traits in their writing throughout the school year.

Ideas for Home Support

As your child practices writing these narratives at school you might consider practicing at home with the following ideas:

- While in the car, encourage your child to use vivid verbs and precise language to describe what they see.
- Challenge your child to explore different character voices through role-play. Select a character from a book and encourage your child to act out that character.
- Study a series of books with your child. Discuss the author's writing strategies and overall word choices.
- Create a sentence game where you and your child take turns building sentences with different structures and lengths.
